INTRODUCTION

This document provides an overview of the outcomes of the Place Standard online survey that was rolled out by Glasgow City Council in June 2020 across nine neighborhoods of South Central Glasgow.


The survey, structured along the format of Scottish Government's Place Standard Tool, collected people's perceptions and comments about their neighborhoods across 14 key place-based themes.

Here we also include the use of wheelchairs, other mobility aids, pushchairs and prams.













KINNING PARK: WHATS BAD?




- Poor condition of roads and pavements
- Cycle routes are not continuous
- Fast moving traffic and busy roads to cross not pedestrian friendly and car-oriented
- No wheelchair or buggy access to Subway
- Overflow of parking from local businesses
- Area used for parking during nearby events at Ibrox and SECC
- Subway users park in the area
- · Car noise and congestion ruins amenity of the area
- No sound barrier protecting homes from M8 noise
- A lot of the place is unattractive industrial estate
- Most facilities seem to be aimed at visitors rather than locals
- Not many activities for children or teenagers
- Not many shops for locals
- Can be difficult for young families to access housing
- Lack of parking provision with new builds
- Some properties are overcrowded
- Area doesn't have an established identity- just busy roads and industrial estates
- Climate related challenges such as flood risk
- Feel unsafe walking at night, due to the high number of empty warehouses, and the motorway cutting through the area meaning routes include often badly lit and isolated underpasses and bridges.
- Parks feel unsafe at times
- Anti-social behaviour and drug abuse issues
- Refuse collection issues & Lack of recycling opportunities
- Fly tipping problems
- Feeling of neglect








